#### **Chairmans Report**


I first moved into the village approximately 40 years ago, the village then was made up of small bungalows on plots of land. The side roads had no tarmac, the main sewer had just been put in, my move in date was delayed while the sewer was connected. I moved in during the winter and from memory it was very cold, there was no central heating in the house so we had to resort to oil heaters to keep warm. My young family had to wrap well even in the house. Several weeks after moving in we noticed a group of men walking up and down the road, I nipped out to see what was going on and was introduced to most of the residence of Homestead Road, they were discussing the laying of tarmac on the road, I was asked if I would help. The plan was simple, some evenings a lorry would arrive loaded with hot tarmac, we would then lay it by hand and roll in stone chippings. The only problem was that we did not always know when to expect the delivery, so we would await a phone message (the lorry is on its way) we would all changed into dirty clothes rush out and spread liquid tar on the surface ready for the lorry load. This went on for several weeks and I became friendly with most of my neighbours.

The weather was colder than now and in the winter it was not uncommon to find Church Road flooded down by the river, either due to snow melt or just rain, as the kids all went to Crays Hill school we would have to wade through up to foot of water or cadge a lift from a friendly Landrover passing by. I soon became involved in the Village Hall and was introduced to another circle of friends. At that time Disco's were very popular and the Hall would run several during the year. As a family we would all go to them, the young ones would fall asleep on some ones lap and we would all dance to 11pm, at times the kids would sit on my shoulders and I would continue to dance (I must have been fit then!). As a family we had all sorts of animals Rabbits, Dogs, Horses, Goats, Chickens, etc. and the children had freedom. Talking to them now they all say what a great time they all had growing up.

St. Mary's Church is open to visitors every Saturday from Mam to 4pm until October Whilst this is an obligation in return for grants received from English Heritage, it provides an opportunity for local residents and casual passers by to come in to view the ancient structure or merely sit for a time of quietness or contemplation.

As this is written we are about to hold a Quiz Night for Church funds, and our concert by the Sid Bolan Big Band in the Church on 25th April will also probably have taken place before you read this. Our next fund

raising event is our Strawberry Cream Tea at the Village Hall on Saturday 20th June from 2pm to 4pm. Tickets are £4 each (children under 10 £2) available from Audrey Pegrum on 01268 710757. Our big event is the Flower Festival over the August Bank Holiday, open on Saturday from 2 to 5pm (light refreshments available) and on Sunday and Monday from 11am

#### Remember the War

In the Summer 2014 issue of this magazine we informed you that thanks to a successful grant application and contributions from Basildon Council, Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council and the Village Hall Management Committee, sufficient funds were now available to progress with the new memorial and remembrance garden without having to rely on contributions from the community and local businesses.

Those of you that attended the RBPC stand at the village fete last summer will have had the opportunity to contribute and comment on the alternative designs and copy concepts that had been put forward, we are grateful to the residents that took the time to share their thoughts and suggestions with us.

Names of military and civilian casualties from the village from both the First and Second World Wars were confirmed prior to their names being engraved onto the tablets that form part of the memorial. Spare tablets have also being included as part of the design in order to provide space should it be required for the names of the fallen in future conflicts.

Whilst the original Plan was to seek and raise funds to replace the existing memorial over a 5 year period, thanks to the generosity of the above mentioned organisations it has been possible to complete the project in just over 12 months.

This action enabled the memorial and garden to be completed in time for Remembrance Day held on the 9th November, a blessing and 100 year Commemorative Service took place with almost 100 residents attending including the congregations from both the village churches.

On the 23rd February an Official Opening ceremony took place with Councillor Terri Sargent, councillor responsible for the environment and community advising that "it is fantastic to see residents getting together to take on a project for the local community, especially one dedicated to

honouring the memory of our fallen soldiers and civilians from the First and Second World Wars"

Richard Wellborne Chairman of Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council, added "For the first time in 70 years the village once again has a visible focal point where the relatives and members of the community, young and old can reflect on the sacrifices made ".

#### A True Story from Long Ago

This is Angela my doll. She has had a very interesting life.

On the night of August 24th 1940, London experienced its first bombing raid.

I was a very small girl living in Peckham, South East London with my parents. We were spending the night in an air-raid shelter in my aunt's garden which was opposite my own house.

My house was bombed and poor Angela was tossed up onto the roof. Somehow she was rescued by the 'air-raid wardens' and restored to me in a rather sad state!

Naturally I was delighted, but there was sadness too. My Grandfather, so I was told, left the shelter to get a bucket water from a stand pipe. They told me that he had dropped a bucket on his toes. In fact, he was killed by flying shrapnel. Shrapnel is a fragment of flying shell.

#### **Teddies for Tragedies Essex Branch**

I've just come in from helping to load a lorry bound for very poor people living in dire conditions – shacks and barrack-like buildings in Montenegro. There are about 2500 people from elderly to babies who are stateless due to fleeing from Kosovo and they have had



their passports taken from them. They all wash in four large cattle troughs and their toilets are unmentionable. There are 5 lorries leaving England at the end of March to take aid to them and to help make conditions better. I was able to give them 27 sacks of crocheted and knitted blankets, new knitted jumpers, cardigans, hats etc. 2 duvets with covers and pillowcases, 450 toiletry boxes containing soap, flannel, toothbrush, toothpaste and comb, new men's sweaters, 450 teddies, 100 clowns, crutches and zimmer frame. Thank you to everyone who helped in any way to get this consignment together.

Again we were able to get Christmas Shoeboxes out to men, women

and children in Eastern Europe which was often the only present they received. Thank you to those who brought a lot of happiness into their lives not only for the presents but knowing that somebody far away was thinking of them.

During the winter, aid and teddies went to Zambia and lots of blankets and jumpers to Kenya.

Our grand total of teddies sent out to 51 different countries is now 289,422.

Let's hope we get a good summer and are able to enjoy it. God bless.

#### **Baptist Church**

#### Bees

Help!....There is a swarm of honeybees in my garden!

......What it is all about? And what should I do? From April to September, you may well come across a swarm of honeybees in your garden - and you may think that it's an alarming sight, especially if you see it fly overhead. There will be a few thousand bees in a swarm, moving like a small, black cloud - and their sound will be like a quietly humming motor. When they settle it may be on a tree or a roof, and they will be a gently moving mass. So what is going on?

The story of a swarm is a fascinating one - and it's a chance to witness a wonder of nature. Essentially, the bees are swarming because they're obeying the urge to reproduce and start a new colony. When the old colony becomes large and when it's thriving, the bees will want to divide it. While a proportion of the bees, including the queen, leave to find another home - the rest remain and raise a new queen. Sometimes the remaining colony can swarm again (a swarm known to beekeepers as a cast), leaving a much reduced original colony. This can be a real nuisance for the beekeeper; because the colony is now smaller it will need time to build up - and these colonies produce less, if any, honey for beekeepers to take for themselves.

Experienced beekeepers can usually spot signs in the hive that the bees are thinking of swarming and they take measures to prevent this happening - but they can still get taken by surprise. Bees are unpredictable and don't play by beekeeping rules! A hive may look quiet in the morning, but by the evening a beekeeper can lift the roof off and find that, despite best efforts...they've gone!

Before a colony swarms, it sends out scout bees to find a new nest site. The bees then move to a temporary site, which may be in your garden. At the temporary site, the scout bees communicate to the others, by dancing on the surface of the swarm, their own choice of a permanent site. Eventually the bees reach a consensus on where to go, all the dancers do the same dance, and the scout bees guide the rest to their new home.

Bees prepare to swarm by feeding up on honey to keep them going until they're finally settled. Well-fed with full stomachs and with a sense of purpose, a swarm of bees is usually quite docile, although it still isn't wise to approach it too closely without a protective suit.

For advice on a swarm of bees in your garden, contact Chelmsford Beekeepers (see below). They have a 'swarm rota' of volunteers who collect swarms where they can to find a new home for them.



#### **Saving Lives**

Each year many lives are saved throughout the country thanks to the use of Automated External Defibrillators (AED) and the volunteers that have been trained in their use.

Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council in conjunction with the Village Hall Management Committee have been looking at the viability of these schemes over the last 12 months in order to establish if this is something that would be of benefit to the community, residents and users of the Village Halls.

Thanks to the scheme which has been set up by the East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust, an AED was presented to Richard Wellborne Chairman of Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council by Kevin Hudson Acting Community Partnership Manager Paramedic.

Anthony Marsh, Chief Executive of EEAST said "I'm delighted that we have started this important project to invest in the communities we serve by improving access to these lifesaving devices in key locations"

"Our ambulance crews aim to arrive at the scene of a cardiac arrest

within minutes however, every second counts and having a defibrillator on scene can make the difference between life and death"

On behalf of the community Richard Wellborne thanked Kevin Hudson and the EEAST for providing the defibrillator and undertook to recruit sufficient volunteers that will be trained in its use, both from the users of the village hall and the residents within the community.

As the AED will require to be housed in a secure location whilst being accessible and it will require to have an electrical connection for charging purposes, the Parish Council has agreed to fund the cost of this specialised cabinet. The location of the AED will be communicated to the community once it has been agreed.

Details requesting volunteers to come forward for training from the community will be communicated at Parish Council Meetings, through the Notice Board at the Village Hall and on the Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council and Village Halls websites.

#### **Baptist Church Minister Writes**

#### CHOICES!

As I write this there are still several weeks to go until the next General Election, but already the campaign is beginning to gain momentum. Party leaders are lining up to make their big promises. Party members are picking holes in opponents arguments. Pundits are analysing and expressing their support or cynicism. By the time the big day arrives I guess many of us will be tired of it all and glad to return to normality. The fact is however that on that day all of us who are eligible are called upon to make a choice. Perhaps in our locality the result will not be in doubt, but we all have to play a part. It is easy to take for granted the privilege of being able to vote freely and without fear in the knowledge that the result will be genuine and not corrupted by those in power.

The reality is that so much of our lives are determined and dominated by the choices we make. some of these choices are relatively trivial and take place on a daily basis - what we will wear, what to eat, what to watch on TV, what music to listen to, what film to go to see, what newspaper to read, perhaps what holiday to have. Other choices are more serious and significant - what subjects to major on at school, what university to attend, what course to follow, what career to pursue, where to live, what partner to commit to, how many, if any, children to have. Our lives are filled with choices and we always have to live with the consequences. All of us have made some great choices (my wife will tell you that I made a great choice in marrying her), and I would imagine all of us have made some bad ones (I once bought a Rover car two weeks before the company went bust)! One thing is for sure, the choice the country makes at the election in May will be important, and we will all reap the benefits or otherwise of the choice we make.

I believe there is another choice that is as important as any of those I have mentioned. Many years ago there was a man called Joshua who was chosen to lead the people of Israel into the Promised Land. We read about him in the old Testament of the Bible. In Joshua ch 24 v 15 we read that he said this to the people, "Choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve... but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Just as for us today, there were many choices open to Joshua about how he was going to live his life - what would be his priorities, what would be the focus of his beliefs, what moral code would he follow, how would he look after and use his resources. He concluded that the best and safest choice

was to trust in God and follow His ways and guidelines. I believe that becoming and being a Christian is to have made such a choice. There came a time in my life when I chose to commit to and follow Jesus, and I believe it is the best choice I have ever made. In fact I believe it is the best choice any of us can make - even more important than the choice facing us at the General Election. He never breaks any of His promises! Jim Hamilton

#### **Chicken and Vegetable Traybake**

#### Ingredients

2 red onions cut into wedges

500g (11b 2oz) new salad potatoes (such as Charlotte) cut in half lengthways

1 red pepper, deseeded and cut into chunks

1 yellow pepper, deseeded and cut into chunks

1 courgette, thickly sliced

8 cloves garlic, left unpeeled

5 tsp olive or rapeseed oil

8 chicken thighs (about 1kg/2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>lb total weight with skin on and bones in), skin removed

1 tsp dried Italian herb seasoning

Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

4 tomatoes, halved

Preheat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Arrange red onions, potatoes, peppers, courgette and garlic in a large non-stick roasting tin. Drizzle over 3 teaspoons of the olive oil; toss to coat vegetables all over. Roast in oven for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile slash each chicken thigh a couple of times with a sharp knife. Place chicken in a bowl, drizzle over remaining oil, add herbs and black pepper; toss to coat chicken.

Remove roasting tin from oven, nestle chicken thighs between vegetables. Tuck tomato halves, cut side up, around vegetables. Return to oven; roast for a further 45 minutes or so until chicken is fully cooked.

Serve immediately squeezing garlic out of the skins as you eat. Serve with a mixed leaf salad or crusty bread, if you like.

#### Cooks tips

Cool any leftovers and refrigerate overnight. Enjoy the next day, reheat until piping hot throughout.

Substitute dried mixed herbs for the Italian herb seasoning.
