Good Bees and Vilage Honey

This summer, the honey I've collected from my garden bee hives is slightly darker than usual. Instead of the golden honey I've been used to seeing in recent years, the honey I've just extracted is more like a liquid amber. This colour, and its distinct flavour, will come from the flowers the bees have been foraging on - and I believe that my bees have been largely flying to the bramble in the hedgerows. Bramble flowers are a favourite food source for bees; watch any bramble hedge in high summer when the small, white, blackberry flowers are out and you will see it buzzing with bees. Bramble honey has a delicious flavour, too, all thanks to the bees' hard work.

When I take my honey from the hives, I'm following a village tradition that is centuries old. I'm using different equipment, of course - and methods that are kinder to the bees (modern beekeeping is all about protecting the bees) but the principle of taking the honey is the same. We know that there is a long history of beekeeping in this area because in the Domesday Book of 1086, Ramsden Bellhouse has four bee hives. Village bee hives were important, which was why they were recorded.

Honey was not only valued for its taste, but for other reasons, too. It was seen as an essential food to improve fertility. A newly wed couple would be given a diet rich in fermented honey (mead) throughout the first month of their marriage (the origin of 'honeymoon'). Mead has also been seen as having health properties. The Romans believed that drinking mead gave you a long life and when the Vikings raided mead from the Saxons, they believed they were stealing a health food.

So when the village bees swarmed, it was essential that they were caught to preserve the precious honey crop. The Saxon king Alfred the Great issued a decree that 'every beekeeper must announce the issue of a swarm by ringing bells or clashing metals, so that it might be followed and captured'. Many medieval illustrations show villagers chasing after a swarm with sticks and metals, making sure that it didn't escape by flying into the next parish!

We know today that honey provides important health benefits, such as its ability to prevent infection following injury and to heal wounds and sores. It's also said that local honey improves the symptoms of hay fever, because eating honey rich in local pollen can help provide resistance to airborne pollen. Many hay fever sufferers swear by this. Honey mixed with hot water and lemon is a remedy for sore throats and a spoonful of honey in a glass of herbal tea or warm milk at night is said to overcome insomnia.

Honey has been part of the way we've lived for thousands of years and we're still learning about how special it is. It is amazing to think that such a super food can be produced from a few bramble flowers in a village hedgerow.



Our first social event of the year, our annual Quiz in April organised by Angela and Steve Tuff was an outstanding success, attracting 12 teams and raising £582 for Church funds.

Next came the Concert by the very talented Southend Vox Choir in May. This was enjoyed by some 60 people and raised the sum of £530.

In June, the Village Hall was once again packed for our Strawberry Cream Tea, which raised a further £680.

In August, our Flower Festival weekend started on a high note with a concert by the Sid Bolan Big Band – held this time in the Church grounds on a beautiful hot evening. Some 80 people attended, bringing their own picnics and many compliments were made on the entertainment provided by the Band and Vocalist. The Concert raised £706.

The Flower Festival is intended to be our main fund raiser of the year for maintenance of the Church, but after the Concert where was everybody? Last year, in spite of periods of rain, there was a good attendance of people to view the floral displays, enjoy the refreshments and patronise the stalls. This year the weather was good, but the attendance poor, which naturally affected the takings, the total at the time of writing this being £2234 - £700 down on last year. This was made up by the profit on the Concert, but that was meant to be an extra fund raiser. Refreshments, including the normally popular Ploughman's Lunches, were down by £250, even after taking into account the £52 raised from a new venture, cream teas. Sales of Raffle Tickets were down by 30%. A disappointing result considering all houses in the Village received a leaflet. We are very thankful for the efforts of people living outside the Village in the running of this event. Our thanks to the Flower Arrangers, tent erecters, stall holders etc.

On Friday 11th November there will be a Beetle Drive at 7.30pm at the Village Hall, this being St. Mary's contribution to the Village Charity Effort. Tickets £5 including refreshments available from Audrey on 01268 710757 or Beryl on 01245 601298.

Our close relationship with Ramsden Bellhouse Baptist Church continues, the next joint event being the Remembrance Sunday Service at 10.45am on Sunday 13th November at the Village Hall and with the Cubs and Scouts on parade. Members of both Churches – men and women – meet every Monday (except school holidays) at the Baptist Church Hall any time between 10.30am and noon for coffee and fellowship, with interesting speakers on alternate weeks. Superfast Broadband!

A couple of years ago Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council funded and produced a leaflet which was hand delivered to every home in the village giving details of the companies that were working with Essex County Council in order to encourage residents to register online with Superfastessex. It was explained that this was a requirement in order that Ramsden Bellhouse would be considered as part of the funding and roll out of the intended faster broadband programme.

Unfortunately to date residents of many other towns and villages throughout Essex have continued to respond in larger numbers than we have, which has meant they have been prioritised before us. The geography and location of Ramsden Bellhouse in its rural area also provides challenges for engineers from BT's local network business

Openreach.

With an investment of £24.6 million, Phase 1 which includes 65,000 homes and Businesses are now enjoying download speeds of 24 Mbps and above as that part of the plan is completed.

Thanks to a further investment of £18.9 million which will extend the coverage to a further 51,000 homes, Phase 2 is well in hand.


Unfortunately as Ramsden Bellhouse is not included in either of these plans, with Phase 3 plans in the early stages and a further investment of £4.5 million available, it is paramount that if we want to be included in this final stage (which will take the penetration of fast speed broadband up to 97% throughout the county) that everyone in Ramsden Bellhouse that is interested in getting out of the the slow lane (with only 2 Mbps) needs to register and demonstrate their interest with Superfast Essex as quickly as possible.

Contained within this magazine is a card that Superfast Essex Broadband have provided that needs to be completed with your details, as you will note you are not committing yourselves to anything other than registering that we as a community want faster broadband.

If you require further information on how you can get faster broadband for your home or business you can go to www.superfastessex.org web site which will give you the answers to any of the questions you may have, you can also register online if you prefer rather than using the card provided.

Those residents that have already registered do not need to do so again,

but we would encourage you to speak with your friends and neighbours that are also having to endure and complain about slow Broadband and get them to register before it is too late.

Update on the Local Plan

Following the launch of the proposed Local Plan in January of this year over 150 of you attended a Parish Council meeting where Officers of Basildon Council were invited to attend and present their proposals.

Understandably it became apparent during the meeting that a large number of residents were unhappy with the proposed plans put forward by Basildon Council to create 45 new homes in mini developments/estates within existing Green Belt areas of the village. Concern was expressed that if this was allowed to proceed uncontested it would set a precedent and open the door to potentially larger scale developments in the future.

Basildon Council advised that they would be providing residents with an 8 week consultation period starting on the 13th February in order that they can submit their views on the plan.

The Parish Council together with representative Road Action Groups agreed that further consultation with the residents should take place, this was agreed to be in the form of a questionnaire which was delivered to every home in the village, in order to establish the preferred option for development if it had to proceed.

Following the response and feedback from the residents it was clear that the majority had voted overwhelmingly to recommend that the preferred option was an 'Infill Strategy' utilising infill sites along existing roads rather than mini estates. This preferred option was also reflected by a show of hands as the opinion of the majority of residents that attended the earlier meeting with Basildon Council.

Before the deadline of 24th March many of you completed and returned the Public Survey Forms on the Local Plan that were provided by Basildon Council as well as on line, with many of you also preferring to send letters supporting the 'Infill Strategy'.

Bringing you up to date in terms of timing for the rest of the process moving forward, as indicated in the Basildon Council proposal it would analyse responses which would take place between March and June, these would then be followed by a statement.

Basildon Council indicated that under "Redraft Local Plan" it was intended to move the plan forward through Scrutiny/Cabinet and Full

Council for approval to consult and submit to Government by the end of 2016.

Consultation would be completed and plan submitted by March 2017 and then followed by examination in Public before the Planning Inspector March - early 2018.

Subject to the above, Adoption would take place by Full Council as Development Plan in early 2018.

Following a published statement by Basildon Council with regard to Ramsden Bellhouse and the Local Plan, we have been advised by Basildon Council that they now wish to meet with the Parish Council in order that a further discussion can take place with regard to the proposed 'Infill Strategy'.

Given the lead times and press date of this publication, further updates will be provided online and through the RBPC Notice Board.

History of Ramsden goes digital

For the last 27 years Isabel Johnson who created 'The History of Ramsden' Exhibition has not only been organising the three day annual event (which usually takes place in the Ramsden Bellhouse Village Hall during February), she has also been adding content to the records, photos, illustrations and articles in order to keep it up to date.

The exhibition now contains many thousands of records many of which cannot be replaced and therefore would not be available to view in an exhibition if anything should happen to them in the future.

In order to make sure the History of Ramsden continues into the future and to preserve the items contained within the exhibition, a team of volunteers have agreed to give up their time in order to archive the files in the first part of a three stage process.

Stage 1. will require each item to be copied by scanning a reference print being taken and catalogued onto a database.

Stage 2. will require that a good quality print be produced to a high resolution standard.

Stage 3. will require many items to be encapsulated in order that they can be protected and mounted onto Exhibition Display Boards, whist the remainder will be inserted into suitable reference folders in order that they can be catalogued, filed and importantly viewed at the exhibition.

As I am sure you can imagine, as well as the time consuming process that will take place and will be provided by the volunteers at each of the three stages, it will also require considerable funds in order to complete the project which includes the purchase of printers, scanners, software, consumables including ink and paper as well as large display boards and folders.

It is probably an understatement to say that it would be a shame to put at risk you having the opportunity to view all the historical items contained within the exhibition and prevent you, your children and future generations from doing the same in the future.

In order to avoid this happening a decision has been taken to set up a Historical Committee to look at ways of raising funds for the project, including obtaining grant funding and inquire if support can be provided by the Village Hall, Parish Council and other organisation's interested in preserving local history of the area including of course the village of Ramsden Bellhouse.

Baked Marrow with Tomatoes and Coriander

1 1/2 lb marrow

8 oz tomatoes, skinned and chopped

½ onion, chopped

1 clove garlic, crushed

1/2 teaspoon whole coriander seeds, crushed

1 level teaspoon dried basil

Oil

Salt and pepper

Method

- Melt a tablespoon of oil in a flameproof casserole, add the onion and garlic and soften them over a gentle heat for 5 minutes. Stir in chopped tomatoes and cook for a further 5 minutes.
- 2. Peel and cut marrow into 1 ½ inch chunks removing seeds.
- Add to the tomatoes and onions together with the crushed coriander seeds
- Add dried basil and seasoning.
- Stir round well, put in casserole with lid on and cook in the oven for 1 hour until marrow is tender, 325F / 170C.
- About 15 minutes before the end of cooking time remove lid, or return to stove, and reduce liquid by simmering.
- Serve.

This is a tasty dish to serve with a roast etc.





