The final event of the Winter was the History of Ramsden Exhibition. I must thank Isabel Johnson, Frank Fisher and their band of helpers for their efforts at this event.





As usual, St Mary's joined with the Baptist Church and the Scouts and Cubs for the Annual Remembrance Sunday Service at the Village Hall in November, which attracted the usual good attendance, the collection of £218.50 was donated to BLESMA. Other joint services with the Baptist Church took place in February and on Palm Sunday, and further ones have been arranged for 11th July at St Mary's and 17th October at the Baptist Church, both at 10.30am

Members of St Mary's and friends went Carol Singing in Glebe Road and Homestead Road on 10th December and collected £180 which was donated to the Children's Society.


Social and Fund Raising events planned for this year are:

****** Bus Timetable

Since 30th November, the route of the NIBS service 237 has been changed to serve the Festival Leisure Park at Basildon. It no longer runs through Noak Bridge Village, but goes straight up Wash Road. It then runs through the Pipps Hill Retail Park, with one stop close to ASDA and another near B&Q. After serving the Festival Leisure Park, it makes use of the new bus only link into Ghyllgrove to reach the Bus Station and then on to the Hospital. It thus now serves the Bus Station in both directions. Times from Ramsden towards Basildon remain unchanged, but are a few minutes later in the opposite direction.

From the Baptist Church Minister

If I told you (with a straight face) that we had a little group of fairies living behind the Baptist church premises, I doubt that many of you would believe me. Equally, if I said that the moon was really made of green cheese, it's unlikely that you would believe that either. (I can't see why though -sounds reasonable to me...)

Well, two very unlikely statements, almost, we might say, verging on the ridiculous. Quite rightly, any sane person would reject them both. Only the gullible or a fool would believe rubbish like that.

Recently, the Easter festival was celebrated at our two churches in Ramsden Bellhouse and while you may not have attended the Easter Day services, it's quite possible that you enjoyed something of the traditional Easter egg.

But what is the actual reason for Easter? It's certainly not chocolate eggs nor even hot cross buns. Rather, as God's church we celebrate the raising of Jesus Christ from the dead.

Now think about that for a moment. Isn't that where I started this article? With totally unbelievable statements? Now here is another one a man being raised from the dead. How unlikely is that?

If you find that hard to believe then you are in good company because when the statement was first made on that first Easter Day (Luke 24: 1-8) even Jesus' friends didn't believe it -and frankly, I don't blame them. I don't think I would have believed it either. But later on Jesus himself appears to them and they realise the truth of the matter. Jesus ~ alive and was raised from the dead.

Well, so far, so good 1 suppose. But, there was one of Jesus' friends who had missed all the action -Thomas. Often today we call him 'Doubting Thomas' which 1 suppose is a bit unfair. Thomas could not -and would not -believe because he hadn't seen the risen Jesus and so he hangs on -'I just cannot believe' he says.

But I admire Thomas. Just because he can't believe this unbelievable story of resurrection, he hasn't totally closed his mind to it and importantly he doesn't cut himself off from the other disciples. Neither do they push him out of their little circle because of it. Rather they all stay together for mutual support and to help Thomas through his difficulty.

And I think this is important for us all. We need never be afraid of honest doubts. The church is where people can be free to air their doubts and then to be helped towards the answers they seek.

Teddies for Tragedies Essex Branch

Despite the severe weather over the winter 4062 teddies still managed to travel to Romania, Zambia, Kosovo and Serbia now making a grand total of 258,896 distributed since 1995.



The March convoy to Kosovo has just left. A lorry took 1200 teddies, 250 clowns, 1124 margarine boxes filled with toiletries, 23 sacks of new knitted blankets, 9 sacks new knitted jumpers, cardigans, hats etc, 3 sacks disposable nappies, 2 large boxes of shampoo, Sudocrem and soap, a baby's crib, Moses basket and various baby equipment, one

fur coat and sweets. I breathed a sigh of relief when I waved the lorry off only to get a call two days later to say another was going into 10 primary schools and could they have 1200 teddies and anything else I could give them especially children's shoes. Apparently children are not allowed in school unless they have a pair of shoes to wear. I only had one day to get organised but managed to get several pairs of shoes, 800 teddies were ready to go, but with Alan's help I got another 400 packed, together with 30 clowns. I then found them 700 pencils, coloured pencils, rubbers, pencil sharpeners and a large quantity of A4 lined paper to add to the stationery they already had on the lorry. Schools really struggle with very little equipment so it was good to help in this way. I was told that in 10 primary schools there were 5,000 children.

Thank you everyone who has been saving me their 500gr. marg boxes and often filling them with soap etc. In October we sent 808 and this time 1124 boxes which is marvellous. I have just been given a photograph of the Minister of Health and Social Welfare for Kosovo personally giving out one of our toiletry boxes!

Having agonised whether I should hold my Drop-in Day on 12th January because of the inclement weather, I decided to go ahead and am pleased to say it was a great success. The final total after some generous donations was £1,065 which is being used to install an improved sound system in St Mary's Church and the balance going to World Child India where they are endeavouring to purchase some land so that the people in

Apple Amber

1 lb apples (weighed after peeling)

4 oz butter

sugar to taste

1 lemon

2 eggs separated

large cut loaf (thick slice) cut into strips approximately 11/2 in wide and sufficient to line the pie dish, 8 - 10 slices crusts removed.

Peel core and slice apples. Put them with 2 oz of the butter and a very little water into a saucepan and cook until tender. Sweeten to taste. Beat until smooth. Add grated lemon rind and juice and the egg yolks.

Melt the remaining butter in a small basin and soak the strips of bread in the butter and line the base and sides of the dish. Pour in the apple mixture. Bake in a moderately hot oven (425F Gas 7 220 C) for approximately 30 mins until the bread is Golden and the filling set.

Whisk the egg whites very stiffly ad fold in 2 oz sugar. Pile the meringue on top of the apple filling and dredge with caster sugar. Bake in a cool oven (325 F Gas 3 170 C) until the meringue is crisp to the touch and lightly coloured. Serve hot or cold.

It is possible more melted butter will be required for soaking the bread.



Parish Council

Since the last magazine the Parish Council has applied for and achieved grant funding of £7,500 from the County Council's Community Initiatives Fund and £14,460 from Veolia Pitsea Marshes Trust for improvements to the play area at the recreation ground.

The project will provide a new piece of climbing equipment and two ride on "springers" with safety surfacing for the under 8 age group. The

paths will be resurfaced and some old surfacing removed.

A previous Parish Council project at the play area was to install the fence. This had two purposes: to prevent young children running into the road and to keep dogs out. The Council has received reports that dogs have been taken into the play area and in one case a large pile of eviidence was left behind! 

The Friends of St Mary's

As I write this the Builders working on our new extension are putting the final touches to their contract work in readiness for the Easter services. Further work will remain to be done including the decoration, landscaping and demolition of the old toilet block. The intention is that these jobs will be undertaken by our own members during the coming months so as to save on the costs while the basic purpose of the building will be completely serviceable.

The purpose of the new work has been to provide two new toilets, one of which will be suitable for disabled wheelchair users, a kitchenette and a new central heating boiler for the church. All of which will have direct access from the church by a new doorway cut through the north wall of the nave.

The total cost of the work will be just under £108,000 and has been made possible by two grants and a lot of hard work. The grants were one of £5,000 from the Garfield Western Foundation and the other of £63,190 from Veolia ES Pitsea Marshes Trust. The balance of £39,810 came from The Friends of St Mary's (£8,810) and St Mary's Fabric Fund (£31,000). Both these funds raise money by running events including the Flower Festival, coffee mornings Spring and Autumn Fairs, Quizzes, concerts, Drop in Days etc. etc.

We hope visitors will be able to appreciate the new work either when they come to our services or by taking advantage of our opening of the church to visitors on Saturdays during the summer months.

One other improvement that we intend to see in the coming months is the installation of a new sound system for those of hard of hearing.

The cost of the work is higher than what might be expected but this is due to the high standard of workmanship and materials that we are obliged to employ on this listed building.

Needless to say our coffers are now very nearly empty and we would welcome new members to help us to maintain and improve our fine building which we hope is a credit to our village and county.

Over the last dozen years we have spent £250,000 on major repairs and improvements to St Mary's church including the major restoration of the 596 year old tower, the retiling of the north side of the nave roof and reshingling of the spire and now the new church extension. All whilst the regular maintenance costs are of the order of £2,000 per year and insurance costing a further £1,200.

It is not widely appreciated that the Church of England does not take

financial responsibility for its buildings. This responsibility falls upon the congregation and the local community. Membership of the Friends of St Mary's is one way that people who are more interested in the church building than its religious services can help to preserve our historic heritage for future generations.
