A Word from the Editor

Sixty years ago Elizabeth II became our Queen. What changes there have been in those sixty years. We can travel all over the world with comparative speed and ease. We can see people we are phoning, we can walk about apparently talking to ourselves with a thing called a mobile phone. We have computers, colour televisions with amazing versitality, DVD's IPods and other things I don't know how to spell. The mind boggles, at these amazing inventions. You can have new hearts, lungs, hips, knees - the list is endless.

But what about changes in Ramsden Bellhouse. Well in 1952 our local council was Billericay Urban District Council now it's Basildon Council. There was no Parish Council. Ninety Nine per cent of our homes were bungalows with large gardens of at least half an acre, where chickens and pigs were kept. The four side roads were unmade rarely free of mud and puddles. We filled the pot holes with ashes from our coal fires. Very few people had central heating or double glazing. The ditches (yes we all had well maintained ditches - and no flooding problems)were full of pollution for there was no main drainage. Oddly enough rarely did long standing residents suffer tummy upsets, paddling in the ditches as children somehow made us immune to the "tummy bug"!

On the positive side we had a good bus service, every hour from Shotgate to Brentwood. Village people patronised the Village Hall, churches were fuller and we had thriving Sunday Schools. We knew our neighbours even if we did call them Mr and Mrs. Our children could safely walk to Crays Hill School on their own and wander over fields and woodlands without fear.

The butcher the baker, milkman and village shop took orders and had regular delivery days. The village policeman was often seen on his bike, and doctors came out to visit their patients when they were ill. We cannot go back, nor would we, in truth want to, but what changes the more mature of us have seen. And what of the future? For myself I hope our village retains a country village character - hedges for the birds, gardens for the bees, and trees and flowers for the rural character - and yes, a few muddy puddles for the children to jump in.

Jowett Long 4 and its connection to Ramsden Bellhouse in BYGONE YEARS



This old Jowett was once part of the Ramsden Bellhouse scenery, the car was originally owned by Frederick William Garvey of Florencehurst, Glebe Road, Mr Garvey purchased the car new from Eric Hora, Automobile Engineer of Rainsford End, Chelmsford.

The registration TW5655 is the original issue from the Vehicle Licence Register office at Chelmsford on 1st June 1926.

The car itself is known as a Jowett Long 4 which means long chassis, four seat tourer.

It has RAC rated seven HP seventeen BHP, it has a 3 speed crash gearbox and brakes to the rear wheels only. It has no modern shock absorbers and very few creature comforts.

this is typical of a light car of this period.

The accompanying photos are of the car at the Sharp's sale 2005 after some 60 years in storage.

I attended the 2005 sale at Gables Service Station, Rayleigh. Whilst I was not successful in winning possession of the car at the sale I later discovered through the Jowett Car Club that the Jowett was for sale again in 2007. On this occasion I managed to purchase the car. The previous owner had a new hood made had stripped paint from the coachwork and fitted four new tyres.

I have now restored the car back to running condition and have been able

to retain the original interior apart from replacing 2 small panels adjacent to the rear seat. The engine is completely original with under 5000 miles. This became quite evident during a precautionary overhaul.




The gearbox is in similar condition and has required no attention. Whilst the rear axle on close

examination found to have a cracked spur gears which has been duly replaced.

I would be very interested to talk to anybody in the village who knew the original owner or his family to learn a little more about the history of the car.


The Friends of St Mary's

Parish Council

The Parish Council, in collaboration with the Village Hall committee are working to improve the availability of and access to high speed communications and modern computing in the village. We believe that this will benefit all residents and especially those who need access to the Internet or other services from home for business purposes.

The programme of improvements is known as the "Digital Village" project currently consists of the following initiatives:

1. Improving the Internet services in the village by working with Essex County Council to take advantage of Central Government funding allocated to provide rural communities with availability of modern fibre optic delivered high-speed Internet. We are also seeking to provide residents with a choice of provider as we believe that competition may help to make the costs of these services more economical. Currently these services are available from a choice of suppliers in nearby towns such as Billericay, Wickford and Basildon but not within our village. A recent

review by the Parish Council identified that the providers of these services have no current plans to extend their fibre optic networks to our village.

- 2. Making available to residents a range of short training sessions in the village hall covering topics such as the use of basic Internet tools such as browsing and email; use of Cloud based services for document or photo processing; media services such as online music and movie possibilities and others.
- Availability of Wi-fi access in the village to enable the use of mobile devices with access to Internet both inside and outside the home.

The Parish Council would very much like to hear from residents. In particular whether residents support this initiative, the type of training courses which residents would like to have covered and any other ideas which you feel might be of general benefit to the community.

Normally our Minister would write this but as we are currently in a 'Pastoral vacancy' this has been written in his place.

As this Magazine will be available in May, Easter will be past. Nevertheless, I hope you will forgive me for writing about Easter, which I find hard to ignore, even though the services in April had taken place some weeks before.

If Christmas is so very important in the Christian calendar, then I think Easter is even more so. Of course without Christmas which celebrates the birth of Christ, Easter could not have happened. While Christmas is tinsel and holly, and a baby in a manger, Easter is a dark story until the burst of incredible light on the third day!

In the night Jesus was betrayed then arrested and taken by the soldiers in the garden of Gethsemane. They took him to the Jewish priest's where they held a farce of a trial. They mocked him, ill treated him. Then they sent him off to Pilate the Roman authority in the land. Pilate questioned him and didn't find any reason for him to be executed as he was being pressurised to do by the priests and the crowd. But Pilate didn't want a

riot to subdue so he released a murderer and sent Jesus to be crucified. So end's Jesus' life, nailed to a wooden cross. Despair and fear grips his followers. It was all over, all their hopes faded away with only a feeling of terrible loss taking their place!

But listen; there is a sub text. When Jesus was arrested he said that if he chose to call to his Father, his Father would send twelve legions of Angels to defend him. But, he said, "I must do my Father's will. The scripture must be fulfilled".

Then when Jesus stood in front of Pilate, and Jesus had not defended himself, Pilate asks him "Don't you know I have the power to release you or have you put to death?" Jesus then said "You would have no power if it had not been given to you from above."

Of course one can dismiss such words of Jesus as his imagination.

But faith is the key to Easter. Especially on the third day, when the resurrection of Jesus happens!

As a Christian I believe that Jesus died for all of us, and that faith in him is essential to knowing him now in 2012. If the resurrection did not occur then all Christians are wasting their time trusting in him, but if it did then what can we do than to believe and trust him who overcame death?

Well I said I can't just ignore or not mention Easter, and I haven't. None of us should forget Easter and what happened so long ago but which can touch us now over 2000 years later, whatever time of the year it is.

Changes to Bus Timetable

Although the number of journeys on the NIBS Route 237 through the Ramsdens and Crays Hill remains unchanged, the following alterations took place on the 5th March.

Firstly, only the first and last journeys to Basildon now serve the Hospital, other journeys terminating at the Bus Station. Coming from Basildon, only the last two evening journeys start from the Hospital (7 minutes later than before), the rest starting from the Bus Station (2 minutes earlier than previously). Secondly, the route in Wickford has changed. Going into Wickford, the bus turns out of Swan Lane into Alderney Gardens, Guernsy Gardens and Station Avenue into the Broadway, so alight at the station or the Swan. Board for the return journey opposite the Swan or at the Station.

Teddies for Tragedies Essex Branch

During the winter months 4960 teddies were distributed in Zambia, Kosovo, Rumania, Sierra Leone and Turkey. Those going to Turkey were for children caught up in the earthquake. This takes the grand total since 1995 to 275,137. 700 clowns have gone to Kosovo with blankets, hats, jumpers, cardigans, baby clothes, shoes and pasta together with 2779 margarine boxes filled with toiletries.

In time for Christmas we sent over 450 shoeboxes through Blythswood Care to Eastern Europe. One story that came back to me from Albania was 'How do you feed five children on the equivalent of 65p'. That was the situation facing one Mum when her two year old son was presented with a box full of gifts. So you can imagine how much it meant to a young widow to see each of her family receive sweets, toys, toiletries, clothes and other useful items. Suffering from untreated depression and ashamed of his inability to provide for his family her husband had drowned himself in a lake. This family's tragic story is all too typical of those who have moved from rural villages to Tirana in the hope of improving their standard of living. The capital's city streets are not paved with gold. This family also received food aid. By filling shoeboxes with practical gifts you have brought joy to children like these and sent a message to those who are old enough to understand somebody cares for them! A big thank you to everybody who supported me in this project.

The 1st Ramsden & Downham Scout Group have just been issued with a Queens Diamond Jubilee badge like all scouts in our great country we shall wear these with pride.





Scouts

Last September the Scouts started work on their Fitness Challenge Badge, which involved a set of physical activities over four weeks followed by sessions on the importance of a healthy diet and sleep and the dangers and harmful effects of smoking, alcohol and drugs. A majority of our 29 Scouts have now obtained this badge, a step on their way to the Chief Scouts Gold Award.

The weekly programme has included plenty of badge work, moving towards the Promise, Creative and Community Challenge Badges and many Scouts have achieved their Model Maker Badge, Guide Badge, and Swimming Badges and nearly completed work for the PR Badge. The Essex Challenge, each month, has seen the Scouts looking at ecorecycling, the Scout Law and Promise and much more. This is a special County Award with the tasks spread over the Scouting year.

Out nights have included swimming, golf driving range, visits to Thriftwood Scout Camp for campfire cooking and axe work, 10 pin bowling at Eddies in Billericay and night hikes around the area.

The Scout Troop continues to meet on Wednesday evenings at the village hall, from 7.30 to 9.30. Two hours never seems enough time!

Weekend events have included: the District Night Hike last November, starting and finishing at Runwell Scout Hut, which took us to Battlesbridge, South Woodham Ferrers and Rettenden - quite a night, the District Swimming Gala in January, Belchamps Wintercamp during February, where the weather was windy then very wet, followed by heavy rain a freezing cold night and a sparkling white frost on the Sunday morning. The sun then came out, warmed us up and dried the tents. Most recently 21 Scouts, 5 Leaders and 1 dad joined in the fun at the Secret Nuclear Bunker, near Brentwood. The Scouts were 'Secret Agents' and had to undertake a number of tasks during this overnight event, which had over 200 participants.

By the time you receive this magazine we will have celebrated our Centenary Fun Day in celebration of 100 years in the Village.

Birds of the Bellhouse

After a great summer with the dragon/demoiselle flies, twelve species in the garden autumn started well with a Buzzard on October 21st and three early Fieldfares. The first Redwing on 27th was a welcome follow on. Most months I see around 30 species in or over the garden and occasionally something rarer. The Sparrow Hawks have been very active this winter reducing the number of Collard Doves and decimating my neighbour's doves. The "common" birds are now becoming less common and it was good to see the Skylark and the odd Thrush. Both Green and Great Spotted Woodpeckers visit most days but the Lesser Spotted has now disappeared. In the middle of November the Pheasants returned, only one male and three females this year. Gardens are great for them as they are large enough to keep away from the cats and will eat almost anything that is available. I still see the Bullfinches and there are a fair number of Tawny Owls. If you go into the garden at dusk or a little after and stand or sit quietly for a few minutes preferably with a hot cup of coffee or maybe something stronger you may hear them calling, as many as four some evenings. If you are lucky they can be seen briefly flying low over the garden. Do not attempt to call them in by imitating the whooo! or kwik noise! as they may be tempted to come just too close. The birds have not been any trouble in the garden this winter both myself and my neighbours feed the birds and I net my cabbages, despite having 60 Pigeons in the garden on a few occasions the Pigeons have not done any damage. Your garden is their supermarket so we must protect our crops from the birds. Many Gulls fly over each night to roost on Hanningfield and their plaintive calls at the darkening are both eerie and soothing. At the end of January I was visited by a Tawny and a Barn Owl. One of my neighbours also saw a Barn Owl at the top of Church Road by the farm. The most unusual bird of the winter was a Little Egret on 14th and 22nd of January. A Woodcock was seen on March 11th.

WEDDING FLOWERS

Banoffi Pie

10oz butter
9oz ginger biscuits crushed
6oz caster sugar
14oz can of condensed milk
2 bananas sliced
½ pt double cream - lightly whipped
1oz dark chocolate

Melt 4oz of the butter. Stir in the crushed biscuits. Press into the base of a 7 ½ inch loose-bottomed flan tin. Chill.

Place the remaining butter and sugar in a non-stick saucepan. Heat gently stirring until the butter has melt. Add the condensed milk and heat gently stirring continuously until simmering.

Simmer on a low heat for exactly 5 minutes to make a light golden caramel.

Pour over biscuit base and allow to cool in the refrigerator.

To serve: Slice the bananas and layer most of them over the toffee. Spread with the cream. Top with the remaining sliced bananas and grated chocolate.

Tips. Slice bananas into a little lemon juice to prevent discolouring.

To prevent the caramel mixture from burning stir continuously over a steady heat.

Serve chilled or at room temperature for a softer toffee.

For safety reasons it is best not to boil the can of condensed milk.

Some supermarkets sell tins of caramelised condensed milk which can be used and heated through with the melted butter and sugar.


