#### **Blackthorn and Hawthorn:**

Simple Beauty in a Village Hedgerow

How do you describe blackthorn and hawthorn blossom in the spring, when these familiar, native, hedgerow trees seemingly burst into life? Their lovely blossom has been described by writers in so many ways, from dazzling, delicate, white crystals to a creamy foam, while their first leaves are a fresh, vibrant green. Blackthorn and hawthorn are truly part of the natural history of our village - planted, mainly, for a practical purpose, but always providing us with a beautiful display in the spring.

#### Blackthorn

Blackthorn grows into a thick, impenetrable hedge, and has long been planted to keep livestock in (and thieves out!) Blackthorn flowers from February to April, (although in last year's mild winter, I saw blackthorn blossom in January) and the flowers appear slightly before the leaves. These are an early source of food for bees.

Blackthorn's latin name is 'Prunus spinosa' - Prunus meaning plum, and it's likely to be an ancestor of the cultivated plum. Blackthorn produces sloes in the autumn (and if you only ever make one country drink, make sloe gin, it's simple to do and so delicious) and it tolerates most soils, although it's less happy in an acid soil.

Blackthorn has a terrific value for wildlife. It hosts several butterflies and moths, and provides a nesting site for birds, most notably the nightingale, a bird of our area of the country (although it's sadly becoming less common here).

Blackthorn wood is used for walking sticks and (Harry Potter fans note!) it was said to be used for witches' staffs and wands. It's also said that Christ's crown of thorns was made from blackthorn.

#### Hawthorn

In folklore and tradition, hawthorn is strongly associated with the month of May. It's also known as the May-tree, because this is the month it flowers (it's known as whitethorn, too, because of its white blossom). Hawthorn symbolises the joy of summer's return; maypoles were made of hawthorn and it was said to be the wreath of the Green Man. The traditional saying 'ne'er cast a cloot til Mey's oot' is advice not to remove warm, winter clothing until the time of year the hawthorn flowers.

Unlike blackthorn, hawthorn leaves come out before the flowers. Older folk may remember these leaves as 'bread and cheese'; they can be eaten, and in fact often were, in times when food wasn't plentiful. Hawthorn berries (haws) appearing in the autumn, can be turned into jellies, wines and ketchups. Haws are also loved by birds, especially migrating birds such as fieldfares and redwings, and by small mammals (like blackthorn, a hawthorn is rich in wildlife; providing nesting sites, cover and food for birds, insects and small mammals, like dormice).

Hawthorn also provides a dense hedge and is easy to grow and keep; it's tolerant of all soils. When buying hawthorn, native hawthorn plants (rather than European imports) are more robust in British soil.

Blackthorn and hawthorn are two wonderful hedgerow trees; full of beauty and tradition and usefulness, with so much to love and appreciate and adding so much to our village gardens and fields.

If you would like to get involved I can always give you a covered shoebox and a list of items to go in it ready for next Christmas

Last September ten scouts and five leaders took part in an overnight camp at Riffhams, near Danbury. The theme of the camp was the Outdoor Challenge Award, which included pitching tents, back woods cooking, fire lighting and safety, campfire entertainment, axe & knives, lamps & stoves and much more. Dens were built in the woods and in the evening games of run outs. The weather was excellent with only one small shower on Sunday morning. Riffhams is a great secluded camp site with plenty of wood for the campfire, which the scouts will definitely visit again. All the scouts who took part have attained the Outdoor Challenge Award.

There is plenty of variety in our weekly activities, which also includes team games such as basketball, football cricket, newspaper hockey, volleyball, rounders and most recently tug-of-war. Practical skills are learnt: food hygiene/safety in the kitchen and at camp, mapping, knotting, first aid and a various types of cooking - pancakes are as popular as ever and Scottish short bread, on Burns Night, went down well.

The second Wednesday of the month is an outnight with visits to Thrift Scout Activity Centre for Pedal Car Racing, Campfire cooking and run outs, Chelmsford swimming pool for badge work and lots of jumping from the diving boards. Just before Christmas a visit to Base Jump trampoline centre in Rayleigh proved to be very popular. We also did a circular hike around Ramsden Heath.

In February eight scouts and four leaders hiked from Stock to Runwell via Hanningfield Nature Reserve, a distance of 7.7 miles. Were the scouts tired after this? While hiking Cubs learnt about railway safety as we had to cross the railway line twice.



#### **Baptist Church**

If you have ever visited the Holy Land you will probably have visited the two seas that form part of the interior of the country. In the north there is the Sea of Galilee and around a hundred miles to the south there is the Dead Sea. Although separated by such a relatively short distance the two seas could hardly be more different. The River Jordan flows from Mount Hermon into the northern edge of the Sea of Galilee and the sea is full of life with fish and all kinds of marine life living in it. The River Jordan continues to flow out of the sea at its southern end and continues down to the Dead Sea which is actually several hundred feet below sea level. The Dead Sea is literally just that - dead! There is literally no life in it, the water is foul smelling and the only good thing about it is that visitors can have their photos taken reading the newspaper while floating effortlessly due to its buoyancy. So why are they so different - one filled with life and the other totally dead?

The answer is of course that the Sea of Galilee has both an inlet and an outlet - the water flows through, whereas the Dead Sea only has an inlet so there is nowhere that the water can flow from, so it becomes stagnant and lifeless.

I think there is an important lesson we can learn from these two seas. The Sea of Galilee takes in and gives out, the Dead Sea only takes in but it never gives out, that is why it is so stagnant. The lesson is that for us to be spiritually, emotionally and physically healthy there needs to be an inflow and an outflow. There must be a balance. If we are always taking in and never giving out there will be stagnancy. On the other hand if we are always giving out and never taking in there will be exhaustion and burn out. For me one of the great things about being a Christian is that life is all about taking in and giving out. We take in all the good things God gives us and then give of our time and energy to help and support and encourage others. That is also why church is important. When we meet together for worship on a Sunday we take in through the prayers, readings, songs and listening to the sermon what God wants us to receive. We get encouraged, challenged and inspired and that gives us the resources to go and give of ourselves in serving and supporting others.

It will soon be Easter when we remember that in dying on the cross and then rising from the dead Jesus made it possible for us to have forgiveness and new life - things that we need to take in - so that we can then go out to give what we can to make the world a better place. Why not come to church this Easter and find out a bit more for yourself?

Which of the two seas in the Holy Land are you most like? Which do you want to be most like?

#### **Parish Council**

#### Local Plan

Currently at the time of going to press, it was anticipated that we would have received notification from Basildon Council of the status with regard to timescales for the next stages of the local plan.

It is understood that whilst Basildon's Plan is ahead of many others around the country there have been delays.

Once details of a revised schedule have been received these will be posted on the RBPC Notice Board and website.

#### Broadband

For almost three years we have been advised by 'Superfast Essex' as to the progress and details of the different stages of the rollout of fast broadband across Essex as it moves towards its target of 97% coverage.

Stage 1. has been completed and Stage 2. is well under way, for Stage 3. (which we understand is the final stage) an assessment of the remaining areas that do not receive fast broadband (including Ramsden Bellhouse) is in progress.

As a number of residents have noticed from the website of Superfast Essex that they have wrongly indicated that there are a number of properties in the village who have access to fast broadband 'when they do not'!

It is important that you check and advise Superfast Essex accordingly if they have wrongly classified your property in order that we are not excluded from the selection process in Stage 3.

If Ramsden Bellhouse is excluded from Superfast Essex's plans ,the Parish Council has been looking at alternative solutions/suppliers that could provide fast broadband at different speeds and costs, in order to suit everyone's requirements and needs.

Presentations and meetings are being arranged during the summer (details will be posted on the RBPC Notice Board and w.site) in order that they can be advised of the options open to them together with a Q&A session, which will hopefully resolve and assist them in the decision making process.

Please remember to contact Superfast Essex on www.superfastessex.org/whatshappeningnext in order to check the status of your individual property and advise them if it is incorrect.

#### Considerate Parking

If you or any of your contractors working on your property need to park temporally on part of the pavement in the village, can you please ensure in consideration to your neighbours and other residents that there is adequate space for pedestrians to pass including those that may be in wheelchairs or with children and prams.

Blocking or causing an obstruction can lead to a prosecution which I am sure everyone would rather avoid!

Finally I would remind residents to avoid causing an obstruction to cyclists by parking too close to the build outs.

#### Saving Lives

A number of residents including those that attended the Defibrillator Training Sessions have asked for a reminder on what the procedure is if they are faced with a possible heart attack or life threatening situation with a family member or neighbour.

In the first instance they should of course contact the Emergency Services on 999 and advise them of their location in order that an ambulance can be sent to them.

If you wish to have access to the defibrillator which is located on the side of the village hall facing the shop, you should also advise the Ambulance Service and provide them with the following Postcode "CM11 1RH" in order that they can provide you with the unlock code.

If you are not confident to use the defibrillator and the village hall is open then it is more than likely that a member of the clubs and playschool that attended the training will be able to assist as around 80 people attended the training.

#### Security and Crime

As you may be aware an increasing number of homes and vehicles in the village have been broken into over the last 12 months including the village shop.

Whilst the police consider Ramsden Bellhouse as a low crime area, we certainly should continue to be vigilant and alert to further potential crime in the area.

Whilst it is up to every resident to assess and implement their own levels of security, professional advice is always useful.

With this in mind the Parish Council is looking to arrange an event in the Village Hall attended by the Police including crime prevention Officers in order that suggested security and best practice methods can be communicated. An update and details will be provided on the Notice Board when arrangements have been made and if anyone in the village is interested in joining a Neighbourhood Watch Team can they please advise the RBPC Clerk Sally Faulkner (sfc@sally-faulkner.co.uk).


