


Downham, or St. Peter's South Hanningfield.

You will note from the above that the Evening Services this winter will continue at 6.30pm, and not change to 3.00pm as in previous years.

On Monday mornings, a Coffee Morning, supported by both Village Churches, is held at the Emmanuel Hall at the Baptist Church. Everyone, women or men, is invited to drop in for a drink and a chat any time between 10.30am and Noon. The possibility of inviting a guest speaker, probably once a month, is being explored.

A new activity, Messy Church, has been started at St. Mary's on the second Saturday each month. Children are invited to come and take part in craft activities, story-telling and singing. Each child must be accompanied by an adult. Sessions run from 11am to 1pm and end up with lunch. Contact Suzy on 01245 224181 or Beryl on 01245 601298 for further information.

Our joint activities with our friends at the Baptist Church have followed the usual pattern, but there was high drama at St. Mary's on Palm Sunday. As usual, members of both Churches were assembling at the Baptist Church for a short service including distribution of Palm Crosses, before processing to St. Mary's for a joint service of Holy Communion. A similar service was due to take place at St. Mary's for those unable to make the walk from the Baptist Church. As this was about to begin, the lights in the Church flickered and went out and the organ fell silent. It was then realised that the vestry was filling with acrid smoke. Loud bangs were heard coming from outside, and on investigation it was seen that the plastic casing where the electric supply



entered the tower was well alight, with flames licking the wooden tower. Fortunately the flames extinguished themselves before the woodwork could catch fire. A member quickly set off for the Baptist Church, and was just in time to stop the procession leaving there. The short service at St. Mary's went ahead in the open air, after which the less mobile took to their cars to go to the Baptist Church taking with them the Service books and Communion Vessels. The Service conducted by Stephen, went ahead in the Baptist Church, with their Pastor Jim giving the sermon as planned. We are very grateful to Jim and the Baptist fellowship for their cooperation and laying on refreshments at such short notice. When returning to St. Mary's afterwards, the electricity suppliers were already at work repairing the damage.

Further joint services with the Baptist Church have been or will be held on 13th July and 12th October, and of course both Churches will be involved in organising the Remembrance Sunday Service at the Village Hall at 10.45am on 9th November.

On the Fund Raising front other activities to replace the discontinued Spring and Autumn Fairs have taken place. On 21st June a successful Strawberry Cream Tea in the Village Hall was attended by some 70 people and, with the raffle and sales of cakes and jams, raised an amazing £529

On 20th July the Southend Vox Choir gave an outstanding concert in the Church, attended by some 80 people. Much positive feedback has been received, and they will certainly be invited back at some time in the future. A lovely warm evening allowed the Cheese and Wine Supper to be enjoyed in the open air, and the event raised £653.

Our biggest event of the year, the Flower Festival over the August Bank Holiday weekend, suffered mixed weather. Saturday afternoon and Sunday were fine warm days, with the open air Songs of Praise on Sunday well attended. Stalls and Ploughman's Lunches were well patronised. On Monday, however, it rained most of the day. Although quite a number of people came to view the floral displays and buy from the stalls which were well under cover, the weather obviously had an adverse effect on the attendance and the takings. Nevertheless the event managed to raise a creditable £2267.

The Annual Coffee Morning in aid of Macmillan Cancer Care took place at St. Mary's on 26th September. A goodly array of tempting cakes, provided by the Cup Cake Ladies of Ramsden Heath was on display. This group gets great pleasure in making cakes for charitable purposes, and many people came from Ramsden Heath, which swelled the takings to a very creditable £377.40. Many thanks to everyone involved.

The last of our "new" events for the year was our Beetle Drive held at the Village Hall on 27th September. This was an enjoyable evening, although the attendance of about 30 was a little disappointing. We are very grateful to Marion Shillum who acted as M.C. as we had no experience ourselves with running a Beetle Drive. Thank you to all who helped organise the event and / or came to support it. The evening raised £266.50. As due to health problems Alan was unable to organise the usual Charity Quiz, the Church's main contribution to the Village Charity Effort, the possibility of running another Beetle Drive in November instead was suggested, and approved by a show of hands. We hope to recruit more players for this.

Looking forward to Christmas, our Carol Service will be held on Thursday 18th December at 7.30pm, and there will be the usual Midnight Holy Communion Service commencing at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve.

Simple Apple Cake

Ingredients

41/2 oz (125g) of melted butter

8oz (200g) caster sugar

1 lb (450g) self raising flour

3 large eggs

2 apples (cookers or dessert) peeled and diced

Topping

1 dessert apple sliced

Mixture of demerara sugar and cinnamon (to your taste)

Method

Preheat oven to 180C, gas 4, 375F.

Mix all ingredients together thoroughly.

Place in lined 8 inch (20 cm) cake tin.

Decorate with sliced dessert apple and sprinkle with the demerara sugar and cinnamon mixture.

Bake for approximately 1 hour or until a skewer, if pushed gently into the centre of the cake comes out clean.

Leave to cool for a short time before turning out onto a wire cooling tray.

Note:

This mixture is quite stiff but will cook to a good texture.

Birds of the Bellhouse Summer 2014

This has been a most peculiar summer. Late spring, dry then lots of rain, strange weather fronts and some say the Jet stream has moved. These phenomena have affected the birds as well as the rest of us. The winter visitors stayed late and the summer ones were also late. I heard Blackcaps on 3rd April and not till 8th were Chiffchaffs seen, this bird a warbler with a monotonous "chiffchaff" call usually arrives in March.

Swallows normally arrive punctually on 4th April. I saw my first one on the 19th. Two weeks late. The last migrant the Swift comes on time on 4th May but this year they deigned to arrive on the 9th not too late. The shock of the year however was a report that the Turtledove was almost non-existent in England and I have not seen any this summer. Usually there are 2 pairs locally and they usually breed. Shooters in Malta have been blamed for their demise, but nobody in Europe is prepared to address the problem. Hopefully they will return next year. The resident birds have had a slightly better season. I saw blue and great tits, a few robins, wrens, dunnocks with quite a number of pigeons. The jay, crow and magpie have not had a good breeding season which was good news for the resident thrush which I believe bred.

Another interesting feature of the season is that I have had a number of sightings of Buzzard on one occasion 5 at once circling over the garden. The Sparrow Hawk has been seen regularly but the Kestrel is now a rare sight. Several Tawny owls have been heard calling late at night recently. On 8th September I saw a mighty flock of 60 Canada geese fly over and what a noise they made.

The strangest occurrence this year is that I have been adopted by a male Pheasant. He first arrived in December 2013 and has visited regularly most days since with the odd absence of a week or so. The bird came into the garden when I was filling up the bird feeders. Instead of running away he came towards me so I tossed him some corn which he ate ravenously. The next day I was sitting on the patio, the pheasant came right up to me and took a feed of grain from my hand. In August he brought 2 young to see me but I have not seen them since. The bird is easy to recognise as it has 2 claws missing on his left foot. Autumn is now here, saw the last of the swallows on 24th September and a calling chiffchaff on the same day.

Bygone Years



Eversley

On March 6th 1915 Horace Abbott married Minnie Ruffels in West ham Church, and they came to live on the new Homestead Estate in Ramsden Bellhouse. As their bungalow in Orchard Avenue was not finished (builders behind schedule even then!), they lodged in "The Croft", which is still there today opposite the Village Hall. This was next door to Minnies mum, who lived in "Chingford", now "Little Gearies".

By the time they moved into their new home "Eversley" in Orchard Avenue, Minnie was in early pregnancy, so Horace requested that their bungalow be thoroughly cleaned before they moved in. Homestead's foreman sent his wife, who was eight months pregnant! - but having already a large number of children herself was used to being permently pregnant and doing housework!

So sometime in Summer 1915 the Abbotts moved into "Eversley" Orchard Avenue, which they had bought for roughly £300 together with two acres of land. Horace worked in London, but planned to have, and did have, a small holding of chickens, pigs and sheep, with the intention of giving up his daily commute to London. Soon it became apparent that he was working in London to support his small holding! Small time farming was not as easy as a town lad had thought. Minnie was not able to cope with a growing family, (no gas or electricity or main drainage no labour saving devices) and escaping sheep and the mating pigs! Minnie had many times to retrieve sheep half way to Crays Hill, leaving her young children in the care of the milkman!

So by the time daughter No 5 arrived, the small holding had gone, leaving behind chicken houses and pigsties for the children to play in! So the trees and bushes grew up on half of "Eversley", and the legend of "Fairyland" came into being. Horace told his daughters that part of "Eversley" was "Fairyland" and no-one ever had to worry what to do with the children in the holidays. Since then four generations of this family have played in "Fairyland", and shared its magic and wild-life.

It is there today, and Horace and Minnies great, great, grandchildren play there and make up their imaginative games. I have it on good authority (Thomas aged 3) that there are at least five fairies living in the bird box down there. Furthermore, when the birds come home from work, they turn the fairies out and even though they cry, they have to spend the night sleeping rough!



After Horace and Minnie died much of the land was sold, and now only 3/4 acre remains in family possession, where daughter No 5 still lives. Most of "Fairyland" is still loved and cared for. Next year this family will have lived there 100 years. Incidentally, I am daughter No 5.



Rev Jean Andrews writes

It seems a little strange to be sitting down to write an article about autumn and winter when the sun is still warm, and I've only just returned from my summer holiday. But, it is September, the days are getting shorter and the nights cooler, so there's no doubt summer is nearly over. I always have mixed feelings about this time of year. It's sad to lose the long light evenings and the warmth of the sun, but autumn and winter can produce some stunning scenery, and there is Christmas to look forward to. In the church, during the last three months of the year, there are quite a lot of special festivals to look forward to.

November is a month for remembering those who have died, with All Saints Day All Souls Day, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day. This year, no doubt, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day will have an added poignancy as we commemorate the centenary of the start of World War 1.

And then comes December, with its build up to the great celebration of Christmas. In church, we prepare for Christmas during the season of Advent, and many families like to count down the days to Christmas using an Advent Calendar.
